Pastor's Letter

Grace and Peace to you in this New Year!

"A New Year, a New You."

I saw a bunch of people say this towards the end of 2019 heading into 2020. Some people were talking about old habits that needed to change, some were talking about diet and lifestyle adjustments that they need to make, and in general, it was a way of referring to New Year's Resolutions.

I want to look at this a bit differently. I don't think using the beginning of the New Year to initiate change works for many of us because it is, quite frankly, arbitrary. In fact, the labeling of calendar months and numbering of years, these are man-made things. It's all fairly arbitrary. Just because the calendar flips does not mean we stop being the people we were on December 31st.

We all have things we would like to change about ourselves. For myself, I wish I was better at being patient. I get frustrated doing things like waiting in line, anticipating an important date, and spending time trying to correct Timmy when he just. won't. get. what. I'm. trying. to say. He's 2.

But just saying, "okay, come January 1, I'm going to be patient", or even "come January 1, I'm going to act patient" doesn't work. I've tried the Weight Watcher thing too. The fact of the matter is we are all creatures of patterns that have been long in the making, and undoing those things is a much bigger matter than turing over the calendar to a new month and year. If you are trying something new, good for you, but don't fret if and when it doesn't work.

So here's what I think we should do about this as Christians: I think we need to first be honest with ourselves about who we are. We are sinners. We are beloved sinners created by a loving God, but we are sinners. And there are parts of what Martin Luther called the "old Adam" that we love. The part that gives in to instantaneous reward. The part that gives in to impulses. The part that betrays our better selves. The part that is okay with saying, "I know I should do this, but I'm going to do the other thing, or say the other thing, instead."

And after we are honest with ourselves, we should pray for God to change our hearts and minds to be more like the people he wants us to be. And then with that mind of prayerfulness and intentionality, proceed.

Then we need to forgive ourselves when we fail. And we will fail. We will eat the wrong foods. We will act on those bad thoughts that we know we should not. We will assume the worst of people- even the people we love. But we don't have to live into that and totally give into that. We can ask for forgiveness, from God and from each other, and then live another day. And in that other day, we hopefully can make the changes that we would like to see in ourselves.

That's what we have, my brothers and sisters in Christ. Another day, and another day, and more and more days. And in each day there is an opportunity to make the best of what God has given us so that we can live out God's love in a world so given over to anger and hatred.

Take that love and run with it!

Kathleen E. Harring, Ph.D, President of Muhlenberg College

Kathleen E. Harring, Ph.D., was named to a two-year term by the College's Board of Trustees in December 2019. Harring had been named the interim president of Muhlenberg College on June 19, 2019. A member of the Muhlenberg College faculty since 1984, Harring most recently served as the College's provost.

During her tenure as provost, Harring was instrumental in guiding a number of important initiatives, including serving as co-chair for Muhlenberg's 2017 strategic planning process, implementing procedures to support the College's diversity initiatives and overseeing planning for new post-graduate programs.

Harring has held several additional senior leadership roles, including vice president and dean of institutional effectiveness and planning and dean of institutional assessment and academic planning. Her service to the College has also included terms as psychology department chair, as a founding member of the College's Faculty Center for Teaching and as a member of numerous faculty and staff committees. She has led accreditation activities, overseen general education reform and acted as the architect of internal assessment systems at Muhlenberg.

Harring is the recipient of the Muhlenberg College Chairman's Award, the Lindback Award for Distinguished Teaching and the Paul C. Empie Memorial Award for Teaching and Service. She frequently presents nationally and internationally on topics as diverse as teaching and learning, outcomes assessment, shared governance and professional development in higher education.

Earning her B.A. in psychology from Franklin and Marshall College, Harring received her M.A. and Ph.D. in social psychology with a minor in quantitative psychology from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. She is married to John Wittenbraker, who serves as managing director and chief science officer at Ipsos, a global market research and consulting firm. They have one daughter, Carolyn, who lives in New York City.



Wonder... about the relationship with the church

and New Year's Day?

Some congregations do indeed serve Pork and Sauerkraut on New Year's Day, but in the early church, it wasn't so easy.

Romans looked forward to the free food and games that occurred at annual New Year's celebrations, but early Christian clerics were not as keen on the revelries. Long before the "war on Christmas," there was the war on New Year's Day.

The non-Christian Romans called January 1st the Kalends of January. The Kalends is what gives us the modern word "calendar." The Kalendae Ianuariae was a time of particular hope and anticipation for the coming year. It was filled with celebrations and religious rites that focused on the health of individual Romans and of the state.

Romans literally got off on the right foot by leading with their right leg as they entered temples, houses and other doorways on this and many other days. One's right foot was considered far more auspicious than their sinister foot (left foot), and one always wanted to begin auspiciously in a new year.

Following the victory of Constantine at the Battle of the Milvian Bridge in 312 CE, Christianity was made the religion of the day and then encouraged by the emperor until his death in 337. With the Roman emperor as its visible patron, the relatively small religion grew mightily over the next few decades. In turn, Christian clerics also became more powerful figures within Roman cities as more people converted. And yet New Year's remained a time for pagan religions.

As Christian influence grew even more, the Christian priests decided to replace a New Year's celebration with another one. Thus, they introduced the Festival of Christ's Circumcision (I am not kidding), which was supposed to be the celebration on January 1. To celebrate Kalends, or New Year, was to align oneself with the pagan religions, so this was very much discouraged, and in some cases, outlawed.

Regardless, smaller New Year's celebrations continued. It never really went away. It finally got to the point where now, we celebrate Christian holidays and New Year's as well. And thankfully, your pastor doesn't have to preach about Jesus' circumcision.
